GST Course Changes and New Course Proposals

The Division of Academic Programs offers special General Studies courses and CSUB Therses. General Studies courses are conetwo-unit courses which focus on material unavailable in the academic department (i.e. Test Anxiety, Study Skills Development, Peer Counseling, Career/Job Search) and on topics in which lower division students express an interest. The course format is always informal and conducive to studefaculty exchange. Courses that have neembeffered in the last five years may be removed from the catalog. Courses that are more academic in nature must receive approval from an appropriate curriculum committee.

CR/NC is the normal mode of delivery for GST courses and any request to change to a different grading basis must be accompanied by a strong justification that includes a clear indication of the grading expectations. Prior grading patterns will be assessed periodically to determine continued suitability of this gading mode.

Most GST courses are not repeatable. A strong justification will include additional outcomes expected from a student who repeats the course, as reflected in the syllabus.

Units: Eachacademic hour (50 minutes) of lecture/discussion/seminar per week translates into a credit unit. Each 23 hours (100150 minutes) of activities translate into a credit unit. It is expected that an average student is required to spend an additional two to three hours outside of class for each unit.
